Who took the photograph?

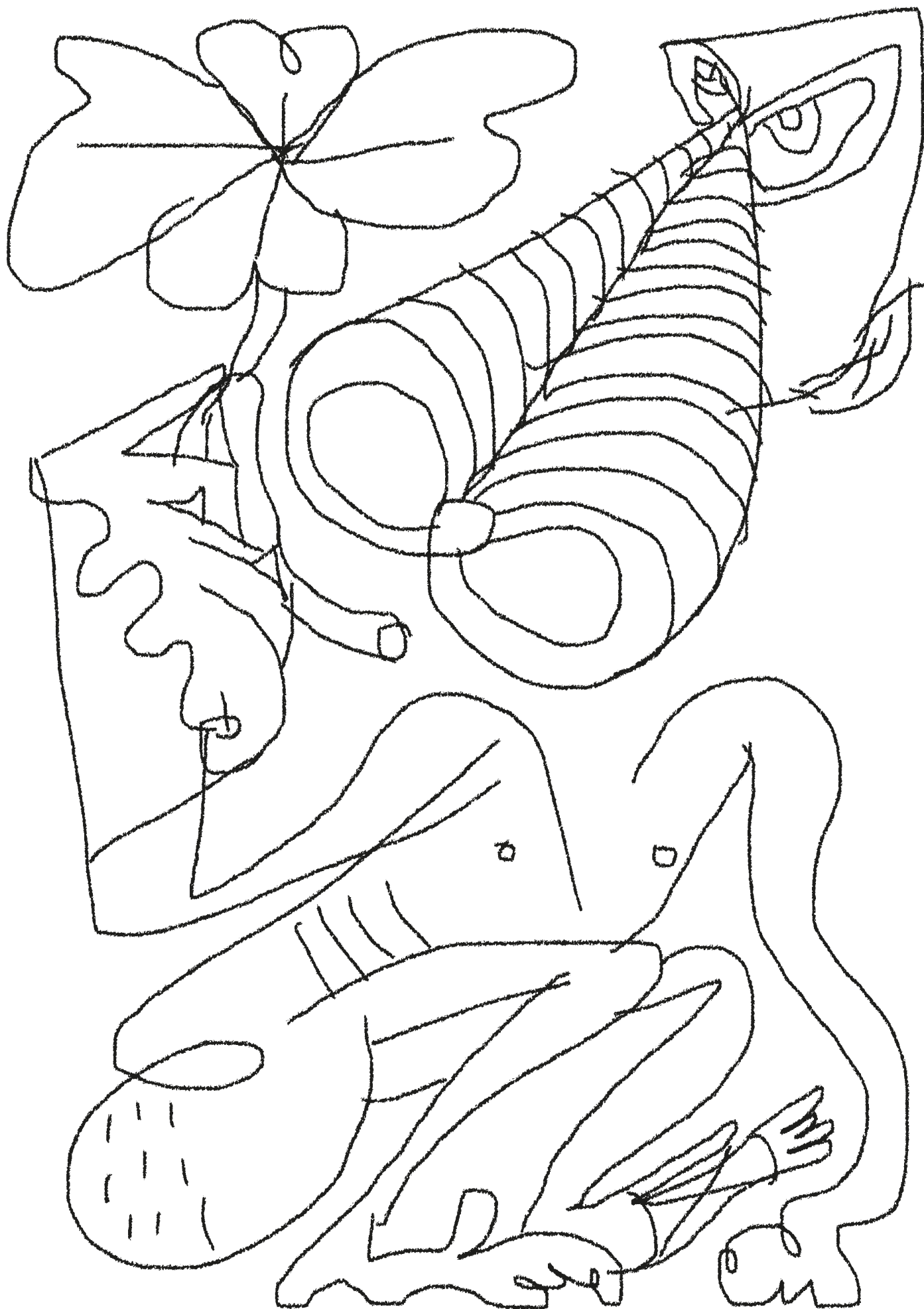
Where several members of the family are taking part, you can generate a conversation about each other's choice of photographs. This process can be recorded or videoed etc.

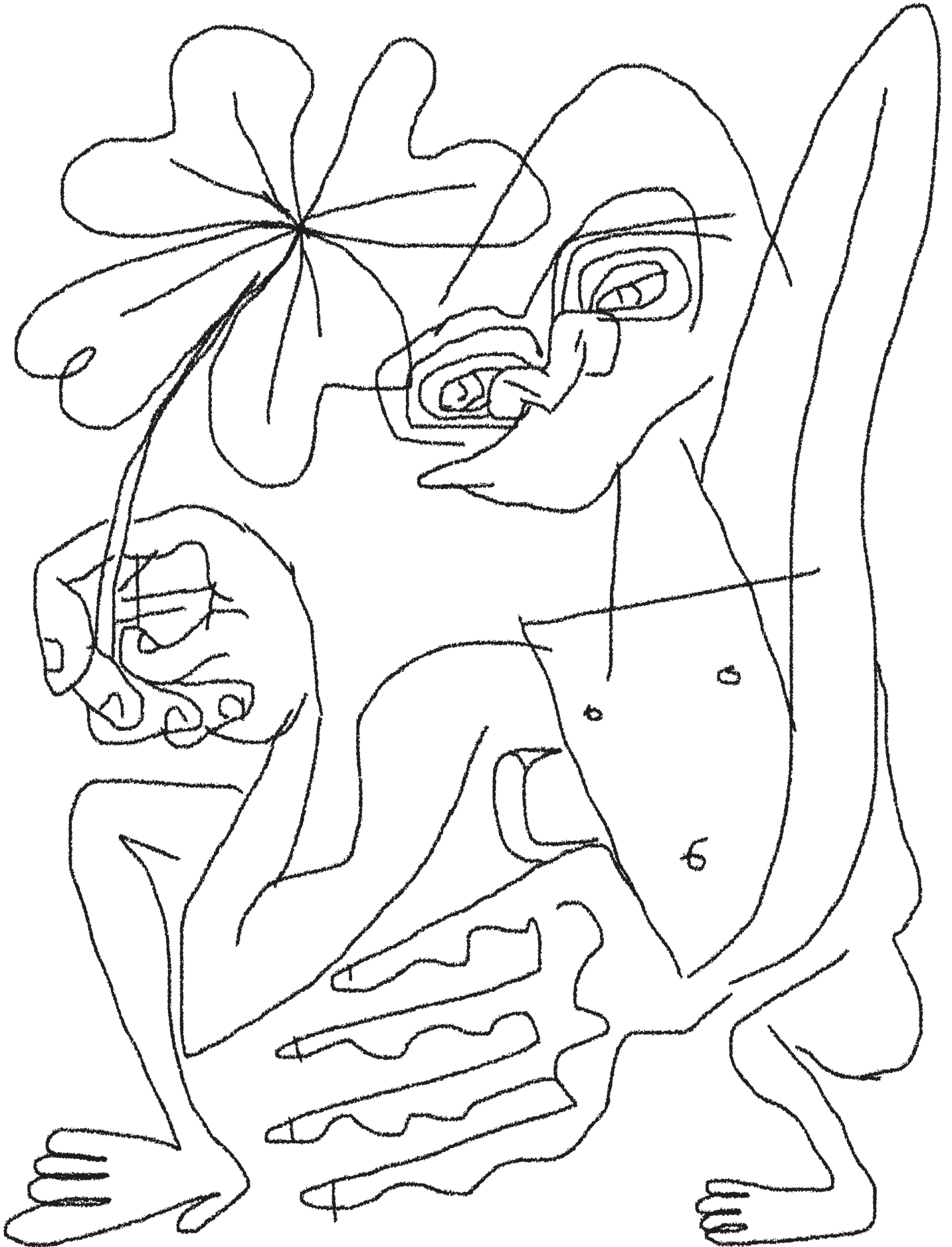
Finally take a photograph of yourself or as a group and add to the pile.

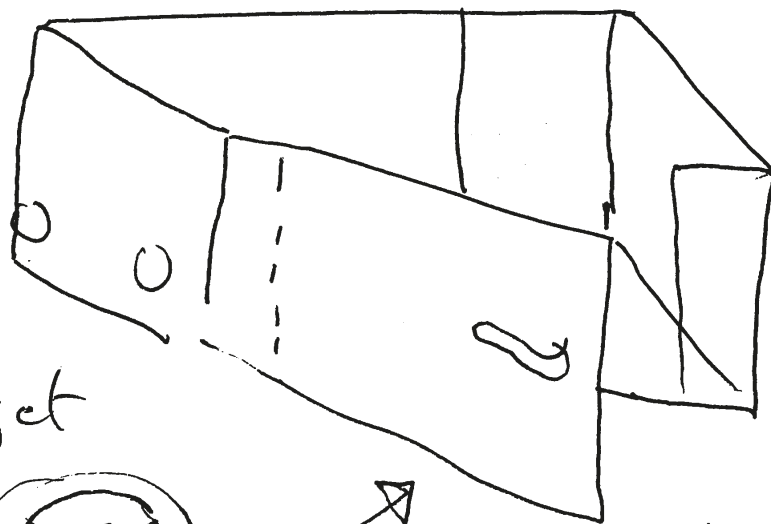






Things to do with a cardboard box -

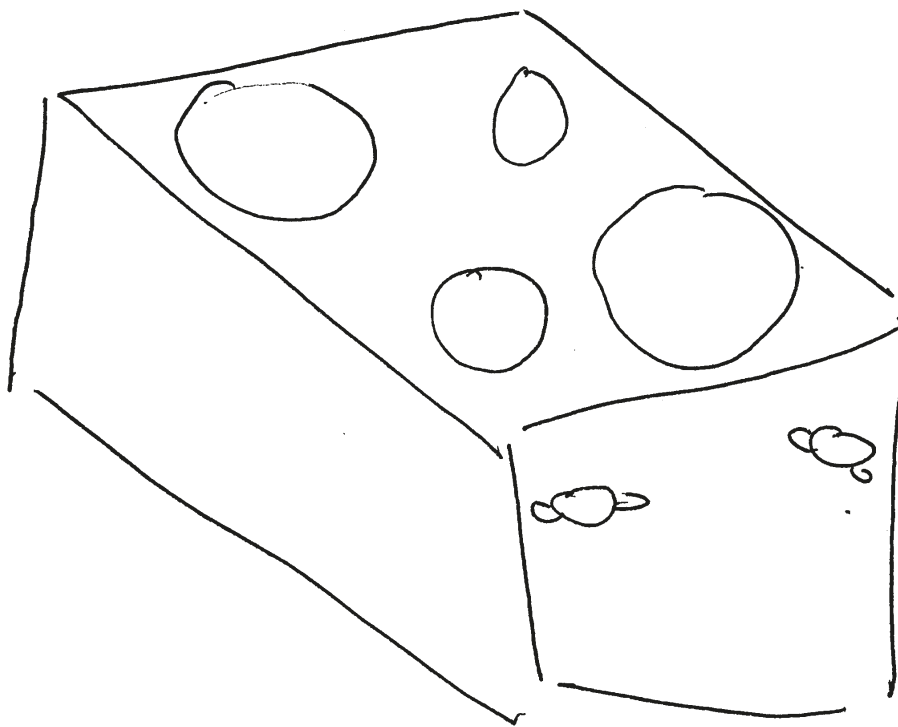

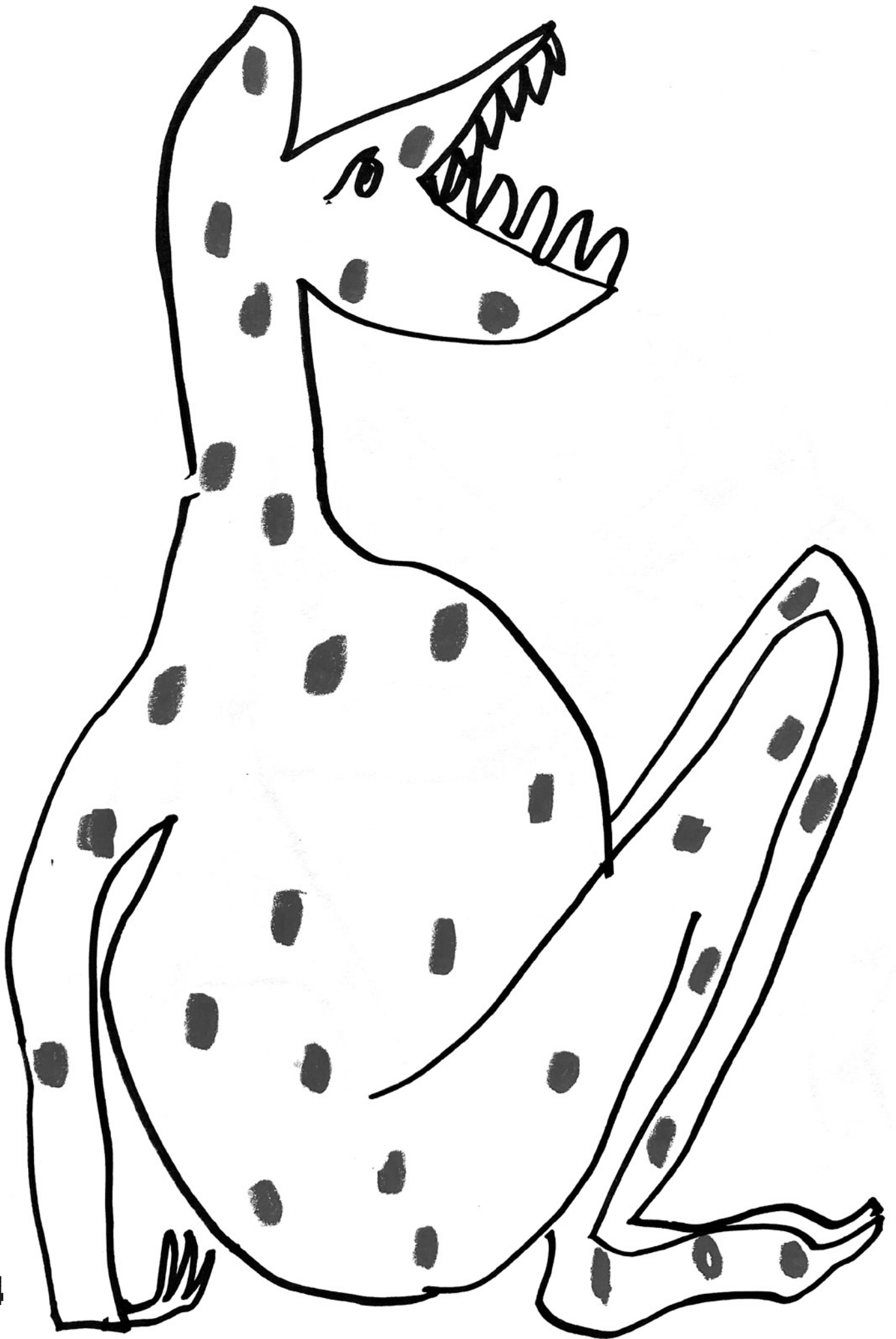


I'm doing quite a bit of sewing. I'd also like to do a big sort out of cupboards and wardrobes. We've all got too much stuff. I like to go through all the clothes. Make various piles. The things I actually wear and will keep. Things I don't wear but can think of someone else who might like them. Stuff that's so worn out I might as well bin it. And things I might do something else with. For instance jumpers. Holey jumpers, and socks, I like to darn. There are two approaches to this – either invisible or strikingly obvious. I prefer the latter. I do have a collection of wool and threads. I choose very bright colours, often a mixture of colours, and darn with them. Sometimes I make the darned area quite bushy. With enormous holes I like to cut a piece out of another jumper, something that suits colour wise or contrasts, and sew that in. This is a good method for dealing with very raggedy sleeves. You can also swap sleeves from one jumper to another – even turning them upside down for a bell effect. Or make a roll neck or collar.

Another good one is Appliqué. Say you have a jacket that's a bit boring, or a t-shirt or any item. Cut some circles from another item (ideally something you would chuck out otherwise) with a different colour or pattern and sew them onto the jacket. The circles can be different sizes. Or some other shape. It's not a case of being good at sewing. Of course it's worth taking as much care as you can but an honest stitch is an honest stitch.

circles you can find.

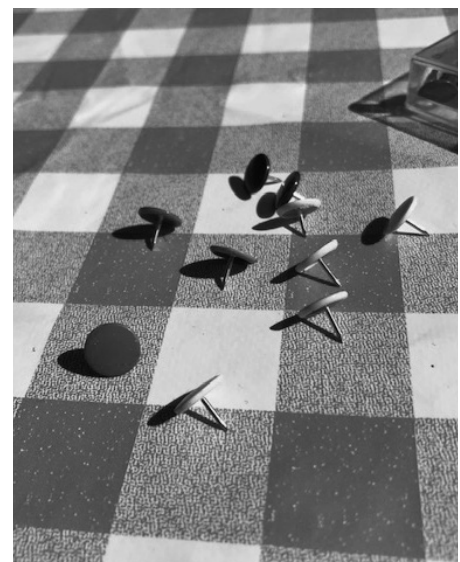
At this stage it can become a scroll
